## Archdeacon Andy writes ...

John the Baptist, the one who came and was the forerunner to Jesus, is something of a model for me as an Archdeacon, as I try to clear the way to enable people in our churches to do what they think God is calling them to do. But it seems that John, especially after his arrest by King Herod, became disappointed, confused and doubtful. You can read about it in Matthew 11:2-6. He had believed that the Messiah would come, fulfilling Old Testament prophecies like release for captives (Isaiah 61). Yet he was in prison, a captive who had not been released. So, John wondered if had been mistaken, if his life had been a waste of time. **Seeking hope**, he sent messengers to Jesus (a great idea if we are discouraged, confused or doubtful: turn to prayer and ask Jesus!). The answer that came back was to look at what was happening, not what wasn't. --What was Jesus doing? Giving the blind their sight, making lame people walk, cleansing lepers, raising the dead and

bringing good news to the poor. Hence the response to John was, "Tell John what you see and hear".

I try also to look at **what God is doing today**, and I am encouraged. G.K. Chesterton once said, "On five occasions in history the Church has gone to the

dogs, but on each occasion, it was the dogs that died." The media continues to talk about church attendance declining. However, it's not true. The statistics show that the Church of England is **growing** – for the 4<sup>th</sup> year running! And then there's the so-called **Quiet**Revival. Have you heard of it – or is it too quiet? (See "The Quiet Revival: Gen Z leads rise in church attendance".\*) This is research by YouGov, commissioned by the Bible Society. It shows that ...

...attendance across all churches in England and Wales is up 50% ...cont. from p.1 over the past 6 years, with this being driven most by 18-24 year olds (up from 4% to 16%), and especially young men (4%-21%). As I travel round different churches, I am also seeing something of this.



Why might this be? I suspect many young adults are finding that they don't want the negatives of what they have seen in their parents' generation. Many will have witnessed relational breakdown in families, the effects of alcohol addiction, and don't want a life that doesn't satisfy. Hence perhaps the massive growth in zero-alcohol beer and other drinks. I suspect some are sick of a culture which is also sick in many ways. So, young adults

are looking for answers from more ancient wisdom about living well. What

## Living traditions

#### thoughts from Tom Simkiss

Last month, Addingham held its annual gala, as it has done for at least the last 65 years. It's just one of the many treasured traditions that make living in a village like Addingham so rewarding and meaningful. The gala is most definitely a 'living' tradition. But not all traditions are created equal, and sometimes they can feel 'dead' and empty of meaning.

I recently came across a wonderful quote, attributed variously to Thomas More and Gustav

Mahler: 'Tradition is not the worship of ashes, but the preservation of fire.' That sums it up perfectly. The point of having traditions is not to preserve the past in aspic, but to bring the past into the present, and to ensure that the present can in turn be taken forward into the future. It's about keeping something alive. And, counter-intuitively, that means traditions are as much about change as they are about continuity. In order to keep a tradition alive, each generation must nurture

it by adding something of themselves to it, in a way that is respectful

and affectionate to what has come before.

Here at St Peter's, we have been discussing our treasured traditions and the ways in which we can ensure that they remain 'living' for generations to come. Christians have a message of hope that has arming lives and communities for 2000 years. St Peter's itself has

been **transforming** lives and communities for 2000 years. St Peter's itself has been a continuous site of Christian worship since 867 AD. Although the building, liturgies and music have **changed many times** over the years, our **core 'living tradition'** of the **gospel** of Jesus Christ, and the open offer to all of an **encounter with God**, remains as alive and well as ever.


