

Hymn Writers

part 6 in an occasional series

Cecil Frances Alexander (1818 – 1895)

No traditional Christmas carol service would be complete without 'Once in royal David's city', often with a treble/soprano solo for the first verse*. This is one of the most lastingly popular hymns from the prolific pen of Mrs C. F. Alexander (as Hymns Ancient & Modern primly calls her); our less formal Anglican Hymns Old & New uses her full name. Born in

Dublin into the Anglo-Irish Ascendancy (her father was land agent to aristocracy) she lived in Strabane in N.W. Ireland. A *prolific poet* from childhood, her religious leanings were influenced by the new 'high church' Oxford Movement, especially John Keble who edited her anthology *Hymns for Little Children* (1848) which ran to 69 editions. It contained perennial favourites like 'All things bright and beautiful' and 'There is a green hill far away' (considered her husband as her greatest hymn of all) as well as 'Once in royal'. Later hymns in our book are

'Jesus calls us! O'er the tumult' (1852) and her translation of 'St Patrick's breastplate' (1889). Widely popular at home and abroad (13 in A&MR) many have now faded as no longer in tune with modern approaches, e.g. for children 'Do no sinful action' (1848); a verse in 'All things bright and beautiful' endorsing class distinctions was later omitted. Her husband became Bishop of Derry then Archbishop of Armagh while she was 'an indefatigable visitor to poor and sick'.


