Hymn Writers

part 12 in an occasional series by Robin Leleux

Christina Rossetti (1830 – 1894)

Christina Georgina Rossetti was a poet rather than a hymn writer but her two Christmas carols (both in our hymn book) remain **favourites** over the Christmas period. She was born in London into an émigré family of Italian radicals, the youngest of four children, all **talented** artists or writers. Her eldest brother was Dante Gabriel Rossetti, founder of the Pre-Raphaelite Brotherhood of artists along

with Millais and Holman Hunt; she sat for him several times (see right), sometimes as Mary, Mother of Jesus.

She embraced the Anglo-Catholic movement which was becoming influential in the Church of England and she remained unmarried for religious reasons, despite having three suitors.

Widely lauded as the **foremost female poet of her day**, **spiritual and social** themes, including feminism, filled her poetry; she also wrote widely for children.



Over the years various of her poems have been **set to music** in whole or part, including by Yoko Ono in 1970. Thirteen years after her death Gustav Holst first set her 1872 Christmas poem *In the Bleak Midwinter* to music with his tune *Cranham* which was well suited to congregational singing. In 1909 the young Harold Darke composed his own setting, more of a choir anthem. (He also composed a tune for another of her poems, *Love came down at Christmas*). The last verse remains thought provoking: 'What can I bring him ... give my heart'.

1st December : Advent Sunday Remember who we're waiting for ...
