

Under Pressure...

Friday: I am wandering around Keighley looking for a barber. Having been advised that my hair is "a right mess", there is some pressure to get it sorted before the weekend. The barber greets me with a cheery "What's it to be, boss?", and suggests, after I waffle helplessly for a bit "A number 3". I have no idea what this is which is why I emerge later with a very cold head, a visible bald patch, £10 poorer, and prominent ears newly exposed to the light of day.

Sunday: in the vestry 50% of the choir is smirking about the haircut - who did this to you? Etc. The congregation joins in after church is finished. My children also enjoy it immensely. Why did I let the barber do this to me? I am too weak to protest, that's why.

Thursday: I'm on a very rare visit to Chapter. 
you and me to work out our own response to wherever we find ourselves. This is even more pressure, but it is a **creative force**. Jesus asks us to look at Him, and the Bible, and to apply both to whatever is pressing in on us, forcing us to make a decision.

interior of church, which bits of land we can or cannot sell, and what to do if we are asked to bless a same-sex relationship. May we act under His pressure, and not our own weaknesses. Mark
