The Lacemakers Prayer



Hymn Writers

Fred Kaan (1929 – 2009)

Some say that including politics in the intercessions is 'not on' (others, like my former vicar, say 'pray through your newspaper'). This stricture cannot apply to hymns, for those of Fred Kaan, seen as one of the foremost of post-war hymn-writers, do touch our Christian conscience, especially his cry for peace in the world. Such are the themes of three of his hymns which we have in our hymn book: 'For the healing of the nations' (which was originally commissioned for

Remembrance Sunday and freed of outdated national theology), 'Put peace into each other's hands' *, and 'We turn to you, O God of every nation'. (Of his other four hymns in our book, two are post-communion hymns.)

Frederik Hermanus Kaan was born in Haarlem in the Netherlands where, as a teenager, he experienced the brutality of the Nazi occupation. This made him both an ardent pacifist and a committed Christian. Influenced by an English penfriend in the Congregational Church, he came to Bristol where he studied for the Congregational ministry. His lengthy career included busy pastoral work in the Congregational and later URC Churches, and finally in a combined local Anglican, Baptist, Methodist and URC team. He also spent several years in overseas work including bringing together the Congregational and Presbyterian Churches into the United Reformed Church. His work centred on human rights, inter-church relations and communications and he visited faith communities in over eighty countries. He still managed to compile six collections of hymns.





Our speaker in May, Vincent Dobson, talked first about Myddleton Lodge in Ilkley, which

belonged to the Passionist Fathers from 1922 to 1985 (Vincent's eldest brother was Brother Justin there) and then became a retreat centre; it has a Calvary garden providing as space for religious thought. More recently the lodge became a youth retreat and then was hired out as holiday lets. Vincent remembers at the Lodge with friends as a child being fascinated by its contents, some of which have been moved to the Sacred Heart church in Ilkley. Vincent went on to tell us the history of

the **Black Hats v White Hats** Match — a treasured part of Ilkley's cricketing heritage. It started in 1810 as a tradesmens' match organised by William Lister and John Beanlands to raise funds for Ilkley Cricket Club and continued, apart for a break during WW1, until 1938. Matches took place during Feast weeks

on land near Ilkley's Crescent Hotel. In 1980 the tradition was revived to mark its centenary, watched by cricketing celebrities, and was then held biennially until the 1990's. The winning side was awarded a valuable silver cup (bought by public subscription), engraved with interesting facts about cricket, which they held with great pride until the next match. Sadly the losers' cup has been lost! Vincent's enjoyable talk led to many questions.
