Lessons from Elijah...?

Sunday: Today's theme covers Elijah. Now there's a hero. He saves the poor, comforts the lonely, and confronts the powerful King with a demand for justice. All in all, a godly superstar. And then he goes further and single-handedly takes on 450 enemy-vicars in the service of Baal. Baal was the god brought into Israel by the King's foreign wife, Jezebel. Baal quickly gained popularity with the people (no collections, free love) and so Elijah found himself alone on the mountain-top in a

grand final shoot-out with the 450. He is far from gracious and polite; to the extent that he taunts them, winds them up, and, having won the fire-making competition, has them all killed. Elijah would have made a challenging Church of England priest. His sermons were



very much to the point and failure to obey was fatal.

Wednesday: I am seated in a barber's chair, and, to my shame and mortification, the

barber has to jack me up in the chair so he doesn't have to bend double to reach my head. This last happened when I was about seven, and so, I balefully predict, the extra cushion cannot now be far behind. We then fall into discussing the church, mosques, and Zoroastrian temples. It is all very polite, and very Anglican. We get on to discussing the challenges faced by religions

who are struggling with same-sex marriages; and we become even more polite. And after all, this politeness is an aspect of religion that many expect from the church along with kindly clergy, a helpful community, warm welcomes, and all-round goodness.

But, what about the Elijah aspect of faith? After his great victory over the prophets of Baal, Elijah finds himself pursued vengefully by Jezebel. He has to flee rapidly and finds himself far from home, all alone, and hiding in a cave. So how kind and caring see overleaf

is the Lord? Not very. God sacks him, and appoints Elisha in his place. It is quite brutal. Elijah is humiliated, but he still obeys. By contrast, after being humiliated in the barber's chair, I, of course, harboured dark thoughts of lashing out, and that's a very human response. Once again, via Elijah, the Lord reminds us that His ways are not ours. What do we know? God is not polite, God deals in a raw and powerful energy that courses through our history, knows us better than we know ourselves, and we need to listen to Him, especially when we think we know better, especially when we are tempted to flee, especially when a Godly replaced by good Anglican Mark manners.



The **Magpie** has kept visiting the greenhouse (no doubt in hope of catching a bird or two), and several noisy **Starlings** are splashing in the bird-bath with great joy!



As I sat looking out of the window, a **Kestrel** came into view again hovering above the garden - probably hunting for some garden birds to attack, but a lovely sight nevertheless. And walking down the lane towards the canal one afternoon, I came across a **Song Thrush** flying low over the fields - so lovely.



I've been reading an article about **Long-tailed Tits** – they line their nest with up to 2,000 tiny feathers!! which keeps the eggs and chicks warm during cold weather in early Spring - amazing!
