An address by Fr. Philip Gray at a recent wedding blessing at St. Peter's (this precis reproduced with permission)

"You are a young, attractive, intelligent, ambitious couple : what can the church offer you today?

Well, after 32 years of my own marriage I offer you this advice : **FLOP**. Be the ones who can flop together, **relaxing** at home, and be the ones who can "flop" securely with each other, who don't have to succeed all the time, who will **support** each other through every kind of "flop" or **failure**.

And what else will it mean to "flop" in marriage?

- F forgiveness of big things if that is needed, but of the little irritating everyday things too.
- L could stand for love, or letting go, but in this case it's for **listening** – paying real attention to each other.



- O stands for "ours" : from now on, change your mindset from "me" and "mine" to "us" and "ours" – the wellbeing of the two of you as a couple.
- P is for patience linked to forgiveness of course, but also to waiting (hospital "patients" know all about this) – wait for each other, wait on each other, wait with each other without impatience.

Today you've come to start your married life **in church and with God**. "Flop" is true here, too – God is overflowing with **forgiveness**, and a relationship with him is about paying **attention** both to his message and to the real needs of those around us. We are all the children of God, one family – we don't pray "My Father", we pray "Our Father", and that community of the **church family** is here for you and for every one of us throughout our lives. You can relax and be yourself here. And, if you don't know that God has **unbounded patience** with us his beloved family (even when we're flops) then you haven't yet grasped who God is, and what his patience and love can mean for you.

So, flop together and flop with the church – and good luck!"
