# Find out about... Healing services

On the first Thursday evening of each month, St. Peter's holds a healing service. If you've never been, you may wonder what this is like, and whether it could be something you would like to attend.

The service is led by two different people each time, the particular emphasis depends on them

but the format is similar, quiet and simple. We sit quietly to start with, then say some prayers



together, sing a hymn and pray for all in the healing professions, and about the prayer concerns left on the Prayer Tree in the preceding weeks. One of the leaders reads a passage, usually from the Bible, and shares thoughts about it.

Then there is an opportunity, if you wish, to kneel at the altar rail and name someone – yourself, or someone for whom you are concerned – and a prayer is said for the healing of whoever is named. It is a very calm and gentle but powerful way of entrusting our worries and our loved ones to the safe hands of God.



The first known census was taken in Babylon in 3,800 BC; records suggest that it was taken every six or seven years and counted the number of people and livestock, as well as quantities of butter, honey, milk wool and vegetables. contd ...for issuing land grants. The Egyptians collected information to plan armies of people to build the Pyramids. The Book of Numbers describes a divinely mandated census when Moses led the Israelites from Egypt. The primary reason in the Old Testament for taking a census was to know the size of a nation's army and its ability to win wars against other people. The Bible debates the issues behind King David and his taking of a census, which was followed by a plague which killed 70,000 people. Why did God allow this plague? Is taking a census a sin? Obviously not, but Satan in his cunning ways set out to entice David to sin by counting his army, which David did, disobeying God; David seems to have been prompted by a feeling of pride

and ambitious curiosity. He did this to determine his **own** power and to trust in it - an unwarranted glorifying in and **dependence on human power, rather than on the Lord.** Better known to

us is the census ordered by Caesar Augustus (Luke 2:2)

which required every man in the Roman Empire to return to his place of origin, thus ensuring that Joseph and Mary travelled to Bethlehem for the birth of Jesus.
