The garden birds have been busy as ever. Lots of Sparrows are here plus Blue Tits and our lovely Robin and Wren enjoying feeding on the lawn.

I was reading that the first swans are arriving soon, they come all the way from Iceland after a non-stop, 700 mile flight. They are resident here in the North of England but can best be seen at the Wetlands

Trust, Welney, Norfolk where they are fed by lamplight in the evenings! I was looking in



my bird book and noted that some swans and geese come all the way from Siberia - simply fantastic. I just love seeing them arrive, landing in the very same fields that they have used year upon year. It gives you a feeling of real courage and thankfulness to think that they have made it for another year. It seems to be such an amazing feat of endurance and navigation.

A pair of squirrels have been busy across the road in amongst the chestnut trees. They jump wildly from tree to tree almost without taking a breath!

Christmas: not presents, but God's presence

Biblical insight : Fruit

The fruit of the Holy Spirit basically, as stated in Galatians 5:22-23, "produces many kinds of fruit in our lives: love, peace, joy, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and

self God's that /ove, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, & self-control.

self control." Fruit grows because the plant is Rooted in fertile soil, and indeed God's life-giving Spirit is fertile. James (3:17-18) takes this further: "the wisdom that comes from heaven is first of all pure and then peace loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit is impartial and sincere. The peace makers who sow in peace raise a harvest of righteousness." Psalm 1:3 is about a tree by streams of water that "bringeth forth its fruits in its season amid leaves which do not wither".

One of the most well-known verses in the Bible is in Genesis, namely "Be fruitful and multiply". A fruitful life is one that is filled with God's grace and favour. God wants us to bear fruit of a Christian character and with a

growth in converts. The vine tree is Jesus himself and Christians are its branches. It means **every Christian is connected to Christ and is part of the body of Christ**. When Paul talks about the fruit of the spirit he refers to fruit that comes from the spirit of God.

Paul was probably the most fruitful servant of the Lord in the New Testament. Writing from prison to the Philippians (1:11), he emphasises that the fruit of righteousness is the outgrowth of righteousness in the heart though belief in Jesus and to the glory and praise of God. Matthew (15:19) states that the fruit of life is a direct result of whatever controls our hearts. Since we are created in God's image we are to be fruitful or creative, in other words like all fruit springing from a seed.

Richard is now taking a break from writing biblically-based articles for Source because of other commitments, but will continue to share insights into peace – thanks for all your contributions, Richard.
